

The Centre for Biomedical Ethics and Law is composed of a team of experts in medical ethics and medical law. The Centre aims to provide education, conduct research, and offer scientific and societal services in these fields. Established in 1986, it will celebrate its 40th anniversary in 2026.



### BACKGROUND AND OBJECTIVES

The number of persons with dementia is expected to rise significantly in the coming years. This growing prevalence, along with the treatment and care for people with dementia, raises numerous important ethical questions and responsibilities. What do we think of the quality of life of people with dementia, and what are our views on their end-of-life care? What are our perspectives on vulnerability and dignity in the context of dementia? What do we consider to be 'good care' and 'a good death' for persons with dementia?

The aim of this course is to foster discussions on foundational, clinical-ethical and organisational-ethical approaches to dementia care. Specifically, the course objectives are:

- (1) To analyze key concepts central to dementia care ethics, such as care, the human person, vulnerability, and dignity. This will provide participants with a comprehensive understanding of the philosophical and ethical foundations of dementia care practices.
- (2) To educate participants on a range of ethical issues that are central to contemporary debates in dementia care, including the use of electronic tracking devices, robotics, sexual expression, advance care planning, euthanasia, and other end-of-life issues. These topics will be explored from both philosophical-ethical and empirical-ethical perspectives.
- (3) To introduce participants to the viewpoints of various stakeholders in dementia care, including patients, relatives, nurses, physicians, institutional managers, and society at large.
- (4) To facilitate exchanges among national and international experts regarding ethics in dementia care.

### **FORMAT**

This course adopts an interdisciplinary approach, incorporating philosophy, theology, medicine, social sciences, nursing, as well as both normative and empirical ethics. Throughout the course, national and international experts will deliver presentations on a range of ethical topics related to dementia care. Ample time will be allocated for in-depth discussion and interaction. The language of instruction will be English.

### **PARTICIPANTS**

The course is designed for participants from diverse professional backgrounds, including healthcare administration, medicine, nursing, psychology, social work, philosophy and theology. It is open to healthcare and social workers, university and university college staff, members of patient associations, ethics committees, and PhD students in these fields.

Reading materials will be distributed electronically prior to the start of the summer course.


